JOB SUMMARY

The Animal Outreach Wildlife Specialist is responsible for the safety, well-being, and exhibition of wildlife in human care. Experience with animal husbandry, training, and handling is essential. Conducts public programs with ambassador animals, delivers engaging interpretive talks on natural history, and works across taxa throughout the department in support of animal welfare. The Animal Outreach Wildlife Specialist is also responsible for co-developing and conducting K-12 and public programs utilizing animals from the Wildlife Collection at the High Desert Museum with emphasis on conservation messages identified in the Conservation Plan. The Specialist will develop and maintain excellent relationships across the Education & Engagement Team and Wildlife Department, utilizing best practices and approaches to educating and interpreting to diverse audiences.
